Publication No. 177 \$45.00 Based upon original correspondence, this is a fascinating account of the controversy surrounding young Peckham's discovery of the fraud perpetrated by greedy oil company officials who had adulterated with kerosine the samples certified as California oil by the highly respected Professor Benjamin Silliman, Jr.

Mexico On Stone. Lithography in Mexico, 1826-1900. By W. Michael Mathes. Tall 8vo, decorated handmade paper over boards, linen spine, paper label. 550 copies. Designed and printed by Jonathan Clark at The Artichoke Press, 1984. Publication No. 178. \$115.00 In this, the first English treatment of the subject, and possibly the first study in any language of the development of lithography and chromolithography in areas of Mexico outside the capital city, Dr. Mathes presents the history and evolution of the Mexican art form and demonstrates the relationship of lithography to printing. Included are examples of subject matter and the differing quality and style of individual lithographers through 24 monochrome or tinted plates and eight full-color reproductions. A useful bibliographical checklist of major Mexican lithographic works and a directory of their producers is also provided.

Publication No. 188. \$87.50 Illustrated with a photogravure frontispiece portrait and reproductions in color of twelve examples of Kennedy's work.

Isadora Duncan & Gordon Craig. The Prose and Poetry of Action by Cynthia Splatt. 8vo, Japanese rayon-silk fabric over boards, linen spine. 450 copies. Designed and printed by W. Thomas Taylor, Austin, Texas, 1988. Publication No. 189. \$95.00 This chronicle of the love affair and collaboration of two of the leading influences on modern dance and the theatre is drawn from extensive research into Craig's own collection at the Bibliotheque Nationale and from material in the Duncan family archives, some of which was long thought to be lost and is here published for the first time. The eight illustrations include Craig's drawings of Isadora and set designs for her dance concerts, as well as a facsimile of one of his letters to her.

Frank Morrison Pixley of the Argonaut. By John L. Levinsohn. 8vo, gray linen with gilt-stamped spine. 450 copies. Designed and printed by Susan Acker at the Feathered Serpent Press, 1989. Publication No. 190 and second in the Literary Profiles series. \$50.00 Founder and editor of The Argonaut literary weekly from 1877 until his death in 1895, Pixley's colorful commentaries reflected the popular beliefs of his era, but he is best remembered today because it was on the pages of his weekly that a whole generation of writers (among them, Ambrose Bierce, Ina Coolbrith, Gertrude Atherton, and Charles Warren Stoddard) became known. Included is a frontispiece portrait, a title-page caricature of Pixley from The Wasp, and seven illustrations. The endpapers are facsimiles of pages of The Argonaut, and the chapter headings are decorated with amusing woodblock vignettes from that publication.

A Book of Gaelic Airs for Una's Melodeon. Collected by Una Jeffers and illustrated by Robinson Jeffers, with an introduction by Dave Oliphant. 500 copies of this book have been printed by the Premier Printing Corporation from Ward Ritchie's design, 1989. The book is 186 pages and is an oblong, 12½ x 8, to accommodate the reproductions of the manuscript, printed on acid-free Mohawk Text, and bound by Bela Blau. Publication No. 191. \$87.00 This book marks the first appearance in print of a manuscript of immense importance to collectors of material by and about Una and Robinson Jeffers. The manuscript consists of a collection of songs gathered and copied by Una Jeffers, illustrated with more than one hundred original drawings by Robinson Jeffers, all published here in facsimile.

A Typographical Masterpiece. By John Dreyfus. A superb account of the making of one of the finest illustrated books of the twentieth century, the Golden Cockerel Press edition of *The Four Gospels*. Printed to the author's design by Meriden-Stinehour Press. More than 40 illustrations, some in duotone. Large format. Edition limited to 450 copies. Publication No. 194 \$150.00

Raymond Duncan: Printer, Expatriate, Eccentric Artist by Adela Spindler Roatcap. The first book devoted to the life and achievements of a famous expatriate (and also Isadora's brother). A lively and entertaining account of "San Francisco's most colorful gift to Paris." Designed and printed by Eric Holub at his Hillside Press. Endpapers, illustrations. Edition limited to 400 copies. A Pictorial Tour of Hawaii 1850–1852: Watercolors, Paintings, & Drawings by James Gay Sawkins. With an account of his life & travels by David W. Forbes. Foreword by Richard H. Dillon. Presented in the form of a pictorial album, this beautiful volume reveals for the first time James Gay Sawkins as a major interpreter and observer of the nineteenth-century Hawaiian landscape. Designed by Jack Stauffacher at The Greenwood Press. 43 full-page color reproductions (including three gatefolds). Large format. Edition limited to 400 copies. Publication No. 197

Six Years Experience as a Book Agent. The true adventures of a woman book traveler in the West in the late 19th century, originally published by the Women's Cooperative Printing Press in San Francisco. Designed by Leda Black at Black Swan Letterpress Printing and Design in Oakland. Embellished with eight illustrations plus a frontispiece reproducing the original paper wrapper illustration. Printed by West Coast Print Center on Mohawk Superfine paper, and bound in cloth-covered boards with two-colored patterned endsheets based on a 19th-century fabric design. Edition limited to 400 copies. Publication No. 198

The 200th Book.

A bibliographical record of the Club's second hundred books, this volume by esteemed bibliographer Dr. Robert D. Harlan was designed as a companion and sequel to David Magee's 1958 *The 100 Books of The Book Club of California*. This handsome folio is embellished with inserts of original announcements as well as facsimiles of memorable title pages and illustrations. It is bound in decorated paper board with a linen back. An Essay on Robert E. Cowan's A Bibliography of California and the Pacific West, 1510–1906. With a Leaf From The Club's 1914 First Edition. The essay by Gary Kurutz traces the making of this landmark bibliography, The Club's bold first publication which is still considered basic in studies of Western Americana. This is no mere account of a dry bibliographical undertaking; it is a tale filled with lively personalities and startling events. The book was designed by Lewis M. Allen and printed by Bruce Washbish of the Anchor & Acorn Press; each copy contains a leaf from the 1914 bibliography. Edition limited to 390. Publication No. 201

Charles and Kathleen Norris: The Courtship Year. Charles Norris and his fiancée, Kathleen Thompson, exchanged daily letters during one year of their engagement, and Richard Allan Davison, noted Norris authority, has edited and arranged them to form a touching story. The Norrises were to become one of the most acclaimed literary couples of the era, but during the year he ventured to New York while she remained in San Francisco, they coped with a variety of practical problems—as well as with a difficult separation. Designed and printed on Mohawk Superfine paper by W. Thomas Taylor, the edition of 400 was bound by Custom Bookbinders of Austin, Texas, in full Japanese cloth. Illustrated. Publication No. 202

Porter Garnett: Philosophical Writings on the Ideal Book. This volume is the first complete book on the famed printer and consists primarily of Porter Garnett's writings on typography and the art of the book. The versatile and cultivated Garnett (1871-1951) was a member of San Francisco's bohemian circles—one of Les Jeunes, one of the originators of The Lark, author of a Grove Play, The Green Knight, and friend to such luminaries of the day as George Sterling, Jack London, Gelett Burgess, and Xavier Martinez. In 1922 he founded the Laboratory Press at Carnegie Institute of Technology, basing his typographic teachings on the ideas and practice of William Morris and T.J. Cobden-Sanderson. Jack W. Stauffacher, who founded the New Laboratory Press at Carnegie in the spirit of Porter Garnett, has collected Garnett's work for this volume and includes writings about Garnett by his friends, a chronology, Garnett's own selection of writings on the arts of the book, and a masterful preface which places to Porter Garnett in an historical context and pays tribute to his typographical ideals. Printed in an edition of 450 copies, the book features one of the first uses of Cycles, a new typeface designed by Sumner Stone. Typesetting by Fancesca Stauffacher; printing by Phelps-Schaefer on Mohawk Superfine; binding by Cardoza-James Binding Company in Japanese

cloth; illustrated with historical photographs and line illustrations. Publication No. 203 \$120.00

The Vineyards and Wine Cellars of California. The book for Fall, 1994, is an account of Australian wine-maker and merchant Thomas Hardy's visit to the vineyards and wine cellars of California, first published in 1885 and now extremely scarce; Dr. Thomas Pinney edited the text and provided a useful introduction; the foreword comes from Robert Mondavi. This large, handsome volume was designed by James and Carolyn Robertson and printed at The Yolla Bolly Press in an edition of 450 on Mohawk Superfine Cover. Phelps/Schaefer Litho-Graphics produced the illustrations, duotone photographs and tipped-in color reproductions of wine labels of the period. The binding is printed burgundy paper with a cloth spine and paper label, executed by Cardoza-James, with a slipcase of gray paper over boards. Publication No. 204

The California Gold Rush: A Descriptive Bibliography of Books and Pamphlets covering the Years from 1848 to 1853 by Gary Kurutz. Designed by W. Thomas Taylor and printed letterpress in Adobe Caslon on Mohawk Vellum; 830 pages; 33 illustrations; index. Sewn and case bound in full blue cloth, stamped in gold on cover and spine. 1,000 copies. Introduction by J.S. Holliday. This bibliography of "California's defining event" contains detailed descriptions of 1,126 issues and editions of 707 individual works. Mr. Kurutz visited leading Gold Rush collections throughout the country in the eight years of his work on the text. Bibliographic references and library locations are included for each entry, as well as publishing history and a wealth of fact and anecdote to give a lively sense of the history of "that rambunctious era" and its rich literature.
